





I agree with the way the union spends my money.

Republicans and teachers with lower family incomes are LESS likely to be satisfied with the way the union spends their money.








I agree that a teacher should be required to pay union fees as a condition of employment even if they don't want to be a member.

Nearly half of all teachers disagree with forced union fees. Only 36% agree.


Republicans and teachers with family income below \$50,000 per year are MORE likely to disagree with forced union dues.







I disagree with many of the union's policies, but I don't want to offend my colleagues who support the union by speaking out.









Nearly 1 in 5 teachers disagree with many union policies but don't speak out to avoid offending their colleagues.


Male teachers and

offending their colleagues.







As a teacher, I would appreciate the opportunity to negotiate salary and benefits for myself.

50% of younger and less wealthy teachers would like to negotiate their salary and benefits for themselves.


Teachers who are over

negotiate their own contract.







As a teacher, I would like the option of a 401(k) retirement plan instead of a pension.

a 401(k) retirement plan.






It's easy to resign union membership.*




Do you agree or disagree with this statement?




Only 1 in 5 teachers believe it is easy to resign from the union.





At what level or grade do you teach?





Do you teach in a public, parochial or private school setting?





Is that a traditional public school or is your school considered a magnet school for a specific focus or style of teaching, a special education school or a public charter school?






In what year were you born?









Generally speaking, do you think of yourself as a Republican, a Democrat, an independent or something else?






What is your present marital status?






The survey was sponsored by Teacher Freedom and conducted by Dynata (formerly Survey Sampling International). A sample of 2000 teachers in 22 states were identified and interviewed from March 13 to March 22, 2018. The margin of sampling error for the aggregate results is 2.2%, but is higher for certain subgroups. The survey was conducted in states that permitted agency fees arrangements prior to the *Janus v. AFSCME* decision.
